Meet Your Relatives

This issue I would like you to meet Marina Ramos, youngest daughter of my sister, Olga Smith.

Marina (born Marisa Marie) was born on September 25, 1978, in Hollywood, CA. Here she is as a baby, with her mom.

When she was about nine months old, Olga moved her family up to Daly City, just south of San Francisco. She began working at



Cleasby Manufacturing, where she met Tom Smith, who has been her husband for the past 19 years. Tom has been "Dad" to Marina since she was a little girl, but she also has a good relationship with her biological father, Bob Ramos.

In 1981, when Marina was 2-1/2 years old, I moved my family to California from Daly City (and in fact, lived with Olga and family for four months). My oldest two children, Ruben and Sonia, have enjoyed a close relationship with their cousin since then.



Blessed with a cheerful nature and a fantastic sense of humor, Marina would come up to Placerville as a teenager and bring such joy to us all. One time in particular stands out in my mind: Marina had arrived at our house to spend some days with us as she was home schooling that year. Ruben came home from school at a later time due to football practice, and he didn't know that Marina was here or even that she was coming. When he came in the house, he found Sonia sitting at the table, and Vickie and Luke there also, and a very strange person was sitting at the head of the table. This person was wearing an overcoat, with a nylon stocking over the face, and a hat pulled down low. The rest of us just acted like there was no one there, and Ruben was gabbing about his day at school, football practice, etc., all the while stealing furtive glances at the silent, unmoving mystery person.

Finally, almost 10 minutes after he got home, Ruben whispered to me, "Mom, who is that person?"

"What person?" I answered.

"Don't you see someone sitting there?"

"No."

But Ruben's intensely confused look combined with my poor acting skills soon ended the ruse.

I'm sure Marina also remembers the time a bat got into our house, and the time we dragged a mattress out onto the porch to watch the meteors streaking across the night sky. We have some great memories!

Thanks to that year of home schooling, Marina graduated from school a whole year early, in 1995. After that, she took classes at Mount Diablo Community College and worked at the same time.

In the summer of 2000, Marina joined us for the family reunion at the home of cousins Carol and Larry Wright, in Tequesta, Florida, where she befriended her younger cousin, Angie Stickle. It was in a sense a good-bye party for her, since she had joined the Air Force and was leaving for boot camp.

After graduation from boot camp, Marina was stationed in Korea. In January of this year she came home for a short visit and then left for her new assignment in Iceland.

In a letter dated July 18, 2002, Marina sent her mother some pictures of her aboard the Chinook. That's her below in all her gear, listening in on the radio.

In one of the photos she was strapped in a harness, standing on the

ledge with the hatch open.





Marina says, "If you look at the full picture of the helicopter, where the back is open, I stood on that ramp while flying just above the clouds. It was such a great experience. We flew out to Reykavik, then to the Westmen Islands. That was just an island until the volcano eruption in 1973. In '73 we evacuated people there and some ended up just staying there."

Some of Marina's other recent adventures include wading in the Blue Lagoon (a natural hot spring), river rafting in the East Glacian River, and deep sea fishing. Marina caught the largest cod. She says, "They [the cod] sure are ugly!"

Marina came home to Martinez for a 2 week visit in September. When she leaves Iceland, her next assignment is supposed to be Italy. *Mama mia!* I know that Olga is going to want to visit her there!

Ruben and Lisa Quiñones (My son and daughter-in-law) spent most of this past summer in Siberia. I recently received a newsletter from them (dated September 18, 2002) so I am cheating and excerpting (with their permission) a couple of the articles that they wrote about their trip.

We've been back from Siberia for almost a month now, and it's high time we sent out a huge thank you to all the people that helped us get there. Thank you so much for being participants in making this trip actually take place. Seeing Russia (again for Lisa, for the first time for Ruben) was a tremendous blessing to both of us, as well as to many people we came in contact with throughout our time there. It occurred to us at the end of the trip that God had provided for us constantly and made the trip a success in so many different ways. Lisa was able to see firsthand a children's tuberculosis hospital and spend hours talking with the doctors there. Ruben got to dig up the Russian that had been entombed in his brain ever since he went to Japan four years ago. We spent many of our meals with the half-dozen missionary families in Ulan-Ude. We were even able to make a separate trip to Yakutsk, where we spent the week with Lena, a German missionary friend that Lisa met four years ago.

We went with an eye toward the future, knowing that God could bring us back there xveral years from now. Although we love the people there, we can't really say anything conclusive at this point. It is definitely a possibility, but we haven't felt that Ulan-Ude is where God is calling us. For Lisa, part of the blessing was seeing the growth in the church since she left in December of 1998. There were xveral church members there that Lisa knew before they became Christians.

One of our most story-worthy adventures was being arrested by the Russian military. Our friend Sasha was videotaping the outside of a prison, and apparently, that's a big no-no. They held us in a little office with a talkative young soldier who was curious about America and why Christian missionaries would come to Yakutsk. Five hours later, we were released, with the videotape no less. A local newspaper later reported that an international scandal was barely avoided concerning a couple of American spies! But we take that as a compliment.
