Rising above a childhood of poverty and hardship, Auntie Marie was the first of the Riveras to arrive in California, where she eventually met and married Achilles George Nicholson (our "Uncle Nick"). Widowed for over 50 years now, Auntie Marie is a great-grandmother who enjoys spending time with her family.

Easter pictures abound in my photo albums. Here is one of me with my mother and sister, taken in the backyard of our home at 1718-22nd Avenue, San Francisco, CA, on April 17, 1960. I was almost 8 years old, and Olga was 12-1/2. My mother, Ana (López) García, was 48 years old.



A Page Out of Our Family History

Years ago I traced the roots of my paternal grandmother, Ana Cruz García, back to a man named **Pedro Vilá**, who came from Cataluña, Spain about 200 years ago.

Pedro married María del Pilar González of Peñuelas, and by 1822 he owned 22 acres of land there in Peñuelas. Pedro and María del Pilar had six children that I know of. My grandmother was the granddaughter of Pedro's third child, María de la Cruz Vilá and her husband, Marcelino de la Cruz.

Pedro's first child, though, born around 1813, was named **Juan de la Paz Vilá**. He married María de los Santos Morales, daughter of José Higinio Morales and María Rodríguez. They had eight children: Engracia, María del Carmen, **Guillermo**, Benedicta, Salomé, José María, Manuel Estanislao, and Pilar.

Guillermo married María de Jesús Velázquez, daughter of Juan Encarnación Velázquez and María Petrona López, on November 14, 1868. They had six children: Valentina, María Amalia Vilá, Bartolomé, **Rafaela**, Magdalena, and Ignacia.

Rafaela married Vidal Cruz, a 24 year old laborer and son of Gregorio and Gregoria Cruz, on June 10, 1906. Their children were Aureliano, Amparo or Luis Vidal, Adela, Jaime, Josefina, Sara, Angélica, Oscar, Adán, and **Julia** (born on June 13, 1926).

On Saturday, July 1, 2000, I finally got up the nerve to contact **Julia Cruz Vilá**, who turned out to be a delightful lady. God willing, we will have a chance to meet Julia and other *Vilá* relatives at the family reunion this summer.

At this time in our family history...

- **Pedro José Rivera Maldonado** was born on April 3, 1875. He was a brother of our family patriarch, "Papa Flor." Pedro only lived for 15 months, though, dying on July 10, 1876.
- 163 years ago, on April 13th, **María Inés Vilá** and **Marcelino de la Cruz** were married. They were my father's maternal great-grandparents.
- On April 22, 1946, my parents (**Oscar** and **Ana**) were married in San Francisco.
- **Florencio Rivera (Tío Guar)** died on April 22, 1986.
- April 23rd makes ten years since my father, **Oscar Cruz García**, passed away.
- **Máximo Cruz**, my father's maternal grandfather, married his second wife, **Genara Maldonado**, on May 5, 1909. He was widowed from his first wife, **María Engracia García**.
- **Jesús Cruz Maldonado** was born on May 20, 1896. He was my father's uncle, the son of **Máximo Cruz** and his second wife, **Genara Maldonado**.
- **Elena Sevilla Rivera (Tío Guar's wife)** would have been 91 years old on May 22nd.
- **María de los Santos Cruz**, youngest sister of **María Engracia García** was born on May 23, 1859.

From Russia, With Love

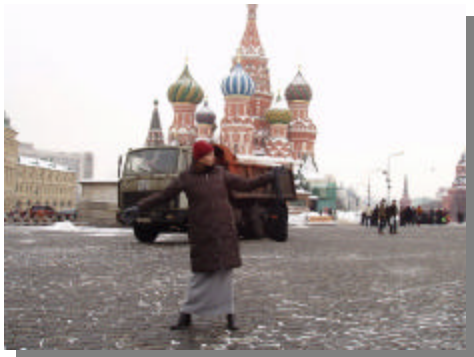

Dear friends and family,

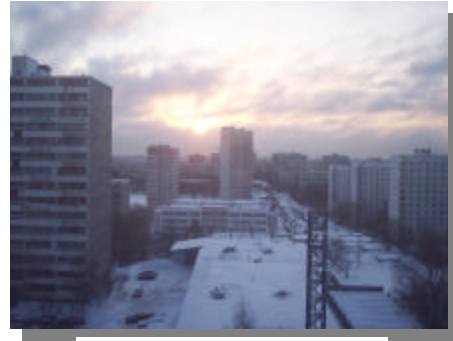
Hello from chilly Moscow! Thank you all for your thoughts and prayers - they have definitely come with me and warmed the late winter days! I have settled in and after only a week of jetlag and language fatigue, followed by very little culture shock, I find myself relatively comfortable here, missing all of you of course but looking forward to what I'm going to see, learn and do here.

"Speaking of here, what ARE you doing there?" you may be asking. My official work title is intern at the WHO in Moscow. I have been so blessed to have received exactly the funds that I needed from my school to come here as part of an elective Program called the global health area of concentration at UCSF. I'm learning about another side of medicine: the policy-writing side. It's interesting, important work. Not quite running around starting IVs at San Francisco General Hospital, but what is? The people here are very nice, and I have had the opportunity to read a LOT about tuberculosis policy, what's going on in Russia, why it's such a problem and what the international community is planning to do to help fix it.

While work is good, I have to say that the highlight of my time here is being able to live and spend time with my dear friends Oyuna and Deanna from Siberia, who are also here for a brief time. Not only them, but the American family I home-schooled when I lived in Siberia is right across the street! I can't tell you what an encouragement it is to live with such amazing women, and how much I have learned with and from them in such a short time. The timing of everything here is truly amazing.

Meet Your Relative...

Annie Meléndez Rivera

Wow, it has been a long time since I wrote a “Meet Your Relative” column. That’s because of lack of information, but the exciting thing is that not only do I have a new relative to present to you, but after the family reunion this June I hope to get enough material on family members for many future “Meet Your Relative” articles. Here’s how this one came about:

Thursday March 10, 2005: Cousin René and his wife, Carmen, took a trip to Peñuelas to scout out relatives. This is the town in which Adela, Oscar, María, Elena, Guar, and Anita were born, as well as generations before them). The one who had made regular trips there, when he was able to, was my father, Oscar. In the past ten years, I don’t think anyone had gone. Well, after Hurricane Georges, in September of 1998, Cousin René tried to enter Peñuelas to check on our great-uncle Angelito (who had already passed away two years earlier, but we didn’t know it). The bridge at the entrance to the town had collapsed, however, and there was no way to get in. So now on this day, March 10th, René and Carmen asked around and were directed to a drug store that was owned, they were told, by a granddaughter of Tía Carmela (my father’s aunt—a half-sister of my Abuela Ana). The proprietor was busy and at the same time, did not know who these strangers from Ponce were, so René left her with some copies of the “¿...y la familia?” newsletter as well as information on the upcoming family reunion.

Thursday March 31, 2005: A very happy René e-mailed me to say that he had just gotten off the phone with cousin Annie Meléndez, the owner of the drug store in Peñuelas. As I found out later on from Annie herself, when René and Carmen had first come into her drug store she thought they were solicitors. She saved the papers they gave her but didn’t look at them right away. Some time later, when she did start reading the newsletter pages and saw familiar family names, she started getting excited. However, by then she had gotten sick and was unable to call up René for several days after that. René was thrilled to hear from her, and wrote, “She is going to contact all the other relatives from Peñuelas to let them know about our thing. She wants to meet me and Carmen in person, so she invited us over.” What a wonderful contact! As René says, now we can tie up some of the loose ends from the Peñuelas branch of the family. René and Carmen did go visit Annie and had a great time.

Saturday, April 2, 2005: [E-mail letter from me to René] I am so happy! I called up Annie and we talked for I don't know how long--over an hour, I guess. She is as wonderful as you said. Annie said she remembers meeting my father when she was a child. She has already contacted many of the family members to tell them about the family reunion. (¡Híjole! We may get close to 200 people attending now!!) Annie is also going to write down family information to send to me so that I can update the Rivera Family History. I told her that Carlos said he'd do a DVD of the Rivera Family History if I compiled the information for him. We talked about Julia Cruz Vilá [see “A Page Out of Our Family History”, page 2] and she told me that Julia was a very good friend of hers. I told her that she and Julia were actually distant cousins. She didn't know that. I told her that we were all descendents of Pedro Vilá. Annie started giving me the names of other people, like her husband, Wilson García Peña. I said, “García? From Peñuelas? He is probably a cousin of mine, too!” I pointed out, though, that Wilson might be a distant cousin of mine but not of hers (so not to worry) because the García line is from our *abuela* Ana Cruz García, but she had a different *abuela* (Genara Maldonado). That would be funny if Annie's husband turns out to be a cousin (which he probably is) because then he can come to the reunion not only as the husband of a family member, but as a family member himself. Annie told me that Carmela had been married to Emilio Melendez, and that he was the brother of Tio Angelito's wife, Obdulia Meléndez. They had two children, Juan and Lidia. Did you ever meet them? Lidia's husband's name was Epifanio Feliciano. I said, “Feliciano? De Peñuelas? The Felicianos are probably my cousins, also.” Maria Engracia Garcia **Feliciano** was our great-grandmother (yours and mine)--the mother of our *abuela* Ana Cruz Garcia. Here is something else that just tickled Annie and me: we are the same age! We were both born in 1952, although her birthday is in Jan. (she's already 53) and I turn 53 June. AND we were both studying at the UPR in Rio Piedras at the same time! Heck, we could have had some of the same classes during the first year (*básico*) and didn't even know we were cousins. She said that she studied there for five years and became a pharmacist and has been in that profession for 30 years. Wow!! So then, when we were talking about the family she started saying, “So and so is a grandchild of this person and was born in such-and-such a year.” She did that for several relatives, and I asked, “How can you remember everybody's year of birth like that?” and she said, “They are all on my computer because they get their prescriptions filled here.” We shared a laugh about that.



Annie and her family (a party of 7) are coming to the San Francisco Bay Area in early June, and Olga and I are going to meet them! We will take pictures and get more information on this family for the June/July issue of the newsletter. And when we go to P.R., I can't wait to visit Peñuelas, and with Annie as the link in the chain, meet a whole lot more relatives!
