It was a wonderful ceremony that included the bride and groom's closest family—Jana's brother and sister-in-law and her niece and nephews, Orlando's daughters (Monica and Leanne), his son-in-law Mike, and his grandson, Tito. It was a lovely expression of the blending of two families. Jana, who has never been married before, was a sweet and lovely bride. We wish both Orlando and Jana much love, joy and blessings in their marriage!

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I took this picture on May 23, 1992 when I traveled to Puerto Rico with Auntie Marie (on the left). Here she poses with my dad, Oscar García, and their aunt Carmela, on the front steps of Carmela's home in Peñuelas.

*Tía Carmela passed away years ago, but her granddaughter, Annie Meléndez, is hosting **next year's** reunion in Puerto Rico. Annie lives in a different part of Peñuelas, but her pharmacy is just a few doors down from the house that her grandmother lived in.*

At this time in our family history...

- *On June 8, 1893, Petronila Pacheco was born. She was a sister of Otilia (the mother of Nery, Isidro, Tita and Delia). Their other sister, Francisca, was born on June 11, 1887.*
- *Auntie Anita Merritt passed away on June 25, 1998 at the home of her daughter, Kathy Caffey in Nebraska. She had been suffering from emphysema for a number of years. Anita was the youngest child of the union of Florencio Rivera and Ana Cruz García, and was only a week old when her mother died.*
- *On July 3, 1861, my great-grandparents, Manuel Alejo Rivera and Maria Apolinaria Maldonado were married.*
- *My beautiful and loving sister, Olga María (García) Smith, went home to Jesus on July 4, 2006, having been led to the Lord by our cousin Mary Lillian Pérez only ten days earlier. My heart aches with loneliness for her, but I will see her again in Heaven some day.*
- *Auntie Adele was born on July 22, 1909 in Peñuelas, Puerto Rico. She was the oldest daughter of the union of Florencio Rivera and Ana Cruz García. She was not quite seven years old when her mother died a week after giving birth to baby Anita.*
- *Florencio Rivera ("Papa Flor")—our patriarch—died on July 22, 1941.*
- *My mother, Ana María López Maldonado, was born in Adjuntas, Puerto Rico, on July 26, 1911. She was the daughter of Juan López and María de los Santos Maldonado. She had one older brother, Confesor.*

I thought you would like to know that this cute little dolly is still in good shape and looks just as new as the first day when she got it from you. She is being in good hands!



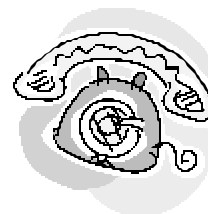

I Remember... “El Cuartito”

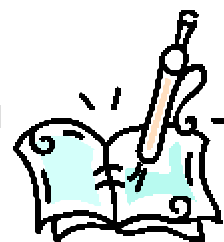
In the house I grew up in at 1718-22nd Avenue in San Francisco, there was a little room in the basement, which—not surprisingly—we called “el cuartito” (the little room). It was mainly used as a storage place, but at different times it served other purposes as well.

As a small child, I played house in there with my sister, Olga. The section of the *cuartito* that was under the stairs was the bedroom, and we put the baby bassinette in there. We had a set of plastic toy dishes and a drain board. Our old discarded family phone was a fun addition to our “home” décor. (I wish I had that antique phone now!) When Olga, five years my senior, outgrew playing with dolls, I still played in the *cuartito* with Joi or my friend from around the corner, Cheryl.



Another favorite childhood game was Hide and Seek, which was tons of fun to play when the Rivera boys and Joi were there to play with us. The *cuartito*, with its storage boxes and dark corners, was the perfect place to hide. The seeker wasn't allowed to pull on the chain that turned on the single lightbulb in the *cuartito*.

When I was about 12, my best friend (Laurie) and I used the *cuartito* as a writer's studio. I remember we were writing a story about a girls' orphanage, and we worked on it every time Laurie came over. I don't know what happened to the story, but it's probably in some box of memorabilia somewhere in the darkest recesses of my basement. I do remember that working on that story and other stories was sooooo much fun, and my childhood desire was to become a writer when I grew up. Maybe after I retire from teaching I'll take up writing.



During my teenage years, Uncle Dave helped Ruben make a dark room out of the *cuartito*. They set up photography equipment in there, and Uncle Dave taught him how to develop black and white pictures. It was such a cool thing to learn to do, and provided many, many entertaining hours of a worthwhile pastime. For a teenage boy like my brother, Ruben, who was surrounded by women (Mom, Olga, Joi, Auntie Helen, me...), Uncle Dave's teaching, mentoring, and companionship was invaluable. Thank you, Uncle Dave! Ruben taught Olga and me how to develop pictures, too, and as a surprise for Mom we made a photo album of her favorite family photos, including the one at left of Dad, Olga and Ruben in 1955. I still have that album.

In 1994 we contacted the family that bought the house from my parents, and they graciously allowed us to visit. I hadn't been in that house since 1971, and I used to dream about it all the time. It was such a treat to be able to tour the house again and show my husband and children the place in which I had lived as a child, although parts of it looked different since the owners had remodeled some of the rooms. It was so exciting and emotional for me that I felt like I was in a dream, but I remember looking in amazement at the *cuartito*, which still looked the same. The family was using it as a pantry and there were rows and rows of home canned jars in it. After all those years, the *cuartito* was still being used in a vital way.

It's funny how such a little basement room can hold so many memories.

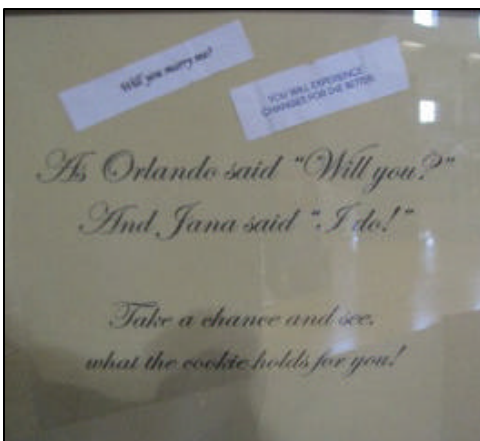

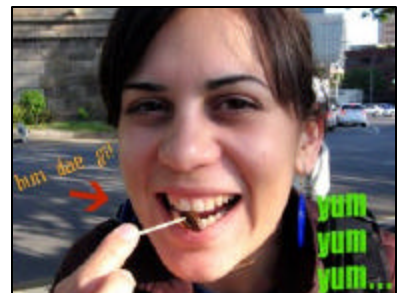
News Flash...
