# The Way We Were

My sister, Olga, was probably about a year old in this photograph from 1948. My mother, Anita (López) García, entered Olga into a baby contest and Olga won a trophy.



## Look What I Still Have!

This unique ashtray, made to resemble an old-fashioned outdoor barbeque pit, belonged to my parents and was in our house in San Francisco for as long as I can remember. I was born in 1952, so it is over 50 years old.



I don't know the history behind it, though. It may have been a gift, or they may have purchased it. All I know is that my mother prized it for its unusual design. I can remember my father using it when he smoked his Camel cigarettes. The smoke would swirl up through the ashtray's chimney.

At this time in our family history...

- My grandmother, Ana Cruz García was born on June 10, 1882 in Peñuelas, Puerto Rico. She died at the young age of 34, leaving behind Adela (7), Oscar (5), María (4), Guar (3), Elena (3), and Anita (one week old).
- Auntie Anita Merritt passed away on June 25, 1998. Anita was the youngest child of the union of Florencio Rivera and Ana Cruz García, and was only a week old when her mother died.
- On July 3, 1861, my greatgrandparents, Manuel Alejo Rivera and Maria Apolinaria Maldonado were married.
- My beautiful and loving sister, Olga María (García) Smith, went home to Jesus on July 4, 2006, having been led to the Lord by our cousin Mary Lillian Pérez only ten days earlier. My heart aches with loneliness for her, but I will see her again in Heaven some day.
- José de los Santos Rivera died on July11, 1845, in Guayanilla, Puerto Rico. He was the paternal grandfather of Florencio Rivera Maldonado.
- Auntie Adele was born on July 22, 1909 in Peñuelas, Puerto Rico. She was the oldest daughter of the union of Florencio Rivera and Ana Cruz García.
- Florencio Rivera ("Papa Flor") —our patriarch—died on July 22, 1941.
- My mother, Ana María López Maldonado, was born in Adjuntas, Puerto Rico, on July 26, 1911. She was the daughter of Juan López and María de los Santos Maldonado. She had one older brother, Confesor.

## Marriages Between First Cousins

In the April/May issue of ¿...y la familia? I wrote about my recent strides in family tree research, which included the discovery of two pairs of first cousins that had married—Manuel Alejo Rivera Maldonado with María Dominga Maldonado Rivera, and José de la Cruz Maldonado with María Mercedes Maldonado. I am sure that this bit of news raised a few eyebrows. For sure it disgusted one cousin who wrote that she was "grossed out" by the "incestuous relationships" in our family tree. I agree that it is icky to contemplate a union between two close relatives, but it is actually permitted in roughly half of the states in America. In Puerto Rico, marriage between cousins is also permitted, even if frowned upon by general society. I remember my mother telling me that her cousin Julio ("Yuyo") married his first cousin, Virginia ("Ginia"). She considered it improper, but loved and respected them nevertheless. During the summer of 1969, I stayed with them for several weeks and have wonderful memories of their large, beautiful family, which included some children close to my age.

This brings us to the topic of health risks associated with the offspring of first cousins. According to Professor Hamish Spencer of the University of Otawa, New Zealand, and coauthor of research on this topic, first cousins who marry run no greater risk of giving birth to children with defects than do women over the age of 40. In a study published by the online journal *Public Library of Science*, the risk of developing congenital defects in babies born as a result of marriage between cousins is just two percent over the average. The risk of mortality among such babies is 4.4 percent higher than average, which is the same in babies born from women in their forties. Professor Spencer, along with Professor Diane Paul of the University of Massachussetts in Boston, are calling for a lifting of the taboo on first-cousin families, claiming that the legislation against such unions is based on "over-simplified views of genetics".

At any rate, taboo or not, risky or not, and like it or not, marriages of first cousins exist in our family tree. We are not alone; as explained in the last issue, this practice, which results in "pedigree collapse", is thought to occur at some point in almost everyone's family tree. Some famous people who married their first cousins are Jerry Lee Lewis, Edgar Allan Poe, H.G. Wells, Charles Darwin, and Albert Einstein.

Okay, so this article turned out to be more of a research paper than a page out of our family tree. Forgive me for that. With the busyness of the end of the school year, I haven't had time to do more genealogical digging. While in Puerto Rico for the family reunion (oh, so very *soon!*) I hope to visit the graveyard in Peñuelas and hopefully dig up (stated *figuratively* not *literally*) more information on our ancestors buried there. I don't think anyone even knows the location of my grandmother's grave (Ana Cruz García, 1882-1916). I would love to find it.

## Your Frayers Are Requested



## It's Time for the Family Reunion!

Peñuelas, known as "La Capital del Güiro" (güiro capital) and Valle de los Flamboyanes" (valley of the flame trees), is where we are having this year's family reunion. Located in the southern coast of the island, south of Adjuntas, east of Guayanilla, and west of Ponce, the town of Peñuelas was founded in 1793 by Diego de Alvarado. Our family roots on the side of Ana Cruz García (mother of Adela, Oscar, María, Elena, Guar, and Anita) and on the side of Otilia Pacheco Arroyo



(mother of Neri, Isidro, Angélica, and Delia) can be traced back to the earliest days of Peñuelas. (Florencio Rivera's side of the family is from Guayanilla.)

**Driving directions:** From Ponce, go west on PR-2, then right after you see the refinery on your left, take Exit 213 and go north on PR-385 for about 3 miles. Turn left onto PR-132 which takes you into Peñuelas and onto Muñoz Rivera Street. Go through the main part of town to PR-386. Turn right onto that road, and look for the marker for Km. 1.2, which is just after you pass a business called El Bambuco on the left side of the road. Take the entrance to the **right** at Km. 1.2 and head to the top of the hill. Annie will have signs out as you get close to indicate where to turn. If you don't get lost (ha ha!) the trip from Ponce to Peñuelas takes about 20 minutes.

We will meet at 9:00 a.m. at *Escuela Josefa Vélez Bauzá*, the high school which is on PR-132 (the main road that runs through Peñuelas). We will have someone to guide us as we caravan up the hill.
- <u>Saturday evening</u>, <u>June 20th</u>—La <u>Gran Fiesta</u> will be held at the community center near <u>Annie's house</u> (same address as her house, except that the kilometer number is 3 or 4 (she's not sure). The dinner will be catered and <u>Annie has hired a live band</u>. Because of the cost involved, there will be an entrance charge of \$10 per adult and \$5 per child aged 5-12. Children under the age of five will enter for free. The doors will open at 7:00 p.m. Come early to reserve a seat at one of the tables; we are expecting an attendance of 150 persons that evening!
- <u>Sunday, June 21st</u>—The Goodbye Breakfast will be at Wilson and Annie's home. After a late night, we didn't want to make it too early, but some of us do have to head out to the airport to fly home, so we will convene between 8:30-10:30 a.m. The closer to 8:30 that you make it, the longer you'll have for those final goodbye hugs and photo opportunities.
