Roberto had been suffering from cancer for about three years and put up a brave fight, undergoing surgeries, chemotherapy and the works. He is now at rest, but for the Rivera Sevilla family it is difficult to grapple with the pain of losing two siblings in such a short time (in the last issue we reported the passing of Raúl).

Born on July 14, 1940 in Ponce, Puerto Rico, Roberto was the second child of Sinforiano (Guar) Rivera Cruz and Elena

Sevilla. He is survived by two children from his first marriage (to Lydia Rivera), Elizabeth and Roberto Rivera Rivera, and nine children from his second marriage (to the late Elena Morales Ríos) - Luz Elena, Roberto, Rosanna, Javier, Johanna, Lourdes, Sonia Noemí, Rosa Evelyn, and Ada Iris. Our heartfelt sympathy goes out to his children and grandchildren, brothers and sisters, and nieces and nephews.


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Reclusive by nature, in his later years Roberto went out of his comfort zone to connect and reconnect with family members. The first time I remember meeting him was at my father's funeral in 1995. He attended the 2000 reunion in Tequesta, Florida and also the 2004 reunion in Lugoff, South Carolina, where the above picture was taken. This picture shows the three Roberto Riveras that were not only all at the reunion, but all staying at the Holiday Inn Express. On the left is Roberto's son, Roberto Rivera Morales, and on the right is Roberto Rivera, son of Isidro and Rosita.

At this time in our family history....

- On December 15th, 1852, María de Jesús García was born. She was a sister of my great-grandmother María Engracia García.
- Also on December 15th, but in 1884, my great-uncle Eugenio Cruz García was born.
- Timothy Michael Warren, son of my sister, Olga, was born on December 26, 1974. He died at the age of fifteen months.
- Juan M. García, a brother of the above-mentioned Maria Engracia García, was born on January 2, 1858.
- On January 15, 1907, my great-uncle Gilberto Cruz Maldonado was born. He was the son of Máximo Cruz and Genara Maldonado. He was the uncle of Adela, Oscar, María, Elena, Guar, and Anita.
- On January 21, 1820, my great-great-grandmother, María Inés Vilá de la Cruz (Máximo's mother) was born. María's father, Pedro Vilá, was born in Cataluña, Spain.

Page Out of Our Family History

Recently, I was contacted by a man from Peñuelas through Ancestry.com, the website that I use for my family history research. His name is José E. Velázquez Rodríguez, and he is a great-grandson of Victoriano Rivera. Victoriano was a brother of Manuel Alejo Rivera Maldonado, and therefore an uncle of our Rivera family patriarch, Florencio Rivera Maldonado. Here in his own beautiful "Spanglish" words, is what José had to say about Victoriano and how he is related to him.

"The real story of abuelo Victorio, or Victoriano is as follows. He was born in Guayanilla; he was the youngest son of José de los Santos Rivera Rivera and Cipriana Maldonado Santiago. Soon after, José de los Santos, his father, died. Our great grandmother Cipriana got married again but I don't remember his name at the moment. Victoriano or Victorio—yo le digo abuelo Victorio como le decía mi mamá—antes de casarse con María Ortiz-Renta tuvo un affair with another woman called María Candelaria Rodríguez Ponce de Leon. They never got married, but they had three children and one of those was my grandfather. Unfortunately, because they were not married my grandfather did not carry his father's last name, Rivera. Abuelo Victorio y Abuela Candelaria had three children from their relationship, Juan José, my grandfather, better known as Juan, 1874-1956, Juana Catalina, born in 1876, and Juan Antonio born in 1878. After Abuelo Victorio broke up with Abuela Candelaria he got married to María Ortiz-Renta and had Tía Juanita, as my mother called her. Abuelo Victorio después que enviudó de María Ortiz-Renta, vino a vivir a Peñuelas y aquí murió. Abuelo se vino a vivir a Peñuelas porque Papá Juan, Tía Catín, y Tía Juanita vivían en Peñuelas. Yo sé el área más o menos en que vivía Abuelo Victorio, pues mi mamá me enseñó. Después que murió Abuelo Victorio, Tía Juanita se mudó para Ponce y vivía en sector La Playa de Ponce y allá murió."

I wish that I had known of José before the 2009 reunion in Peñuelas; I could have met him in person, and he could have attended the reunion! I asked him if he knew Cousin Annie Meléndez (not related to him since Annie is from the Cruz side of our family, not the Rivera side), and he said he did know our pharmacist cousin.

I loved making this connection and will continue corresponding with José. I'll keep you all posted as we unearth more pages of our family history.

On the second day of our visit, Vickie and Robin came by, we had introductions, and the remainder of the day was spent reminiscing about the old days and getting caught up on each other's lives. Vickie is

such an energetic person! I wish I had a tenth of her energy. On the third day, Vickie, Robin and I discussed business while Joi and Garnet shopped quilt stores. We had a very good discussion; it helped me tremendously. On the fourth day, Joi and I discussed her website needs. She got excited for the possibilities, though she realized the large amount of work she has ahead of herself to prepare her products for sale on the site. Later that evening Sasha arrived and after a joyous reunion after more than 50 years, the memories of our childhood experiences in the 40's and 50's just came pouring out. Sasha filled in some gaps for me and told us stories about her life that just kept us entranced the whole evening. She's such a great story teller and like Vickie, she's so full of energy.

Perhaps the most emotional story she told us was the one of my father's return at the end of World War II. As she tells it, tells it, my father had sent a letter and a package in advance of his visit. The package contained his parachute made of silk and the letter proclaimed that he wanted to marry my mother within three days of his arrival. Sasha said Auntie Anita García, Auntie Marie Nicholson, my mother and others used the silk from the parachute to create my mother's wedding gown. I recall seeing an old photograph of my parents' wedding, my dad in his uniform and my mother in her wedding dress. On the day of his arrival, Sasha remembers a knock at the door. Sasha was just a little child at the time. She recalled the door opening and at first seeing my father's military boots, then the pants which were tucked into the boots, then the rest of his uniform and finally his face. The date would have been near the end of September 1945. My parents were married October 2, 1945.



What makes this story all the more amazing is that for many years, unknown to many of us or simply forgotten, Auntie Helen had kept my mother's wedding dress in storage. After she passed away, cousin Joi discovered it and gave it to me and Garnet. Now, knowing the story behind the dress makes it even more special. I am so thankful to have it.

I must say that I am so overjoyed after this trip. Meeting wonderful family members I haven't met before and seeing Sasha after so many years.....it was a very emotional journey for me. I am so thankful for the opportunity. I hope our next visit will be soon!

For those of you older family members who remember my mother's cousins, Johnny's mother, Ana Ida Olivera Olivera, is the sister of Elia, who together with her husband, Juanín Olivera, owned a plant nursery called Ponce Gardens for many years.

Anyway, through my subsequent correspondence with Johnny, he "let me in" to see his Tribal Pages, and I told Carlos about the program. Carlos checked it out and declared it to be pretty much what he had been planning to develop for our website. For a nominal yearly cost, he could acquire a Tribal Pages account for our family and eliminate hours of planning and developing his own family tree program for our "y la familia?" website.

The next step was for me to send him my Family Tree Maker file. In the past, we had tried this and it was a royal headache, but this time I followed some instructions that Carlos gave me that were on the Tribal Pages website and created a GED format file. A few clicks later, Carlos had my file, and our Tribal Pages account was born with over 1,600 names in it!

Carlos and I are very excited about this new development, and we hope you will take the time to visit the website, get familiar with it, and add information on your own family. One neat thing about this is that instead of me bugging you at family reunions for information, you can enter it by contacting the site administrator (Carlos) and giving him your information, which he will promptly upload. Another neat feature is that by clicking on the relationships tool, then selecting two different names from the family tree, you will be told how those two persons are related. Here is a message from Carlos:

"In case you are not aware, Norma and I were able to upload and post our family tree online! This is fantastic because it now gives each family member the opportunity to update their own family's data and even upload photos of family members! Previously, Norma has had to do this by herself and only after gathering information from each person. **Please visit http://ylafamilia.tribalpages.com and request an invitation**.

As administrator of the site, I will receive your request when it is forwarded by the website. As a family member, you will have access to private family information and be able to update yourself, your spouse and descendants.

This is exciting and a huge step forward for cataloging our family's history! — Carlos"
