
A Year in the Life of Hayli



Other times those same hands would rest briefly on my hot forehead to gauge whether or not I had a fever. I'm proud to say that this is a skill that she passed on to me, and which I used many a time on my own children.

Mama's hands stirred the pot rhythmically on the mornings that she made us Cream of Wheat for breakfast, the scraping of the spoon in the pot making a sound that will forever be etched in my memory. I find myself making the same motions to produce a similar sound when I make Cream of Wheat.

Recently I was hemming a pair of pants and had to measure the length that needed shortening. What did I use to measure? My fingers of course, just like I saw Mama do time and time again. Randy laughs at my measuring techniques, but it works! I measured "cuatro dedos" as I ironed a crease all the way around. Just look at that picture of my hand, with the shape of the nails and everything...that could have been Mom's hand!

Mom's hands were always busy. That's the way I always remember them...cooking, cleaning, sewing, gardening,



painting, fixing things, washing dishes, hanging up clothes to dry on the line.... Even when she was playing her favorite game, Yahtzee, Mom's hands were working, because that's what she jokingly called playing Yahtzee. In Puerto Rico, when I'd go to Ponce to visit her, she's ask, "¿Quieres trabajar?" ("Do you want to work?") and that was her secret way of asking me if I wanted to play Yahtzee.

All that work takes its toll on hands, but every little wrinkle is a badge of honor, and so if my hands look worn out next to my precious Mimi's baby skin, that's okay. I'm proud to say that my hands look like my mother's.

At This Time in Our Family History

- April 3, 1875—Pedro José Rívera Maldonado was born. He was a brother of our family patriarch, "Papa Flor." Pedro only lived for 15 months, though, dying on July 10, 1876.
- Apríl 9, 1912—Auntie Marie, baptized as Maria Perfecta, was born in Barrio Santo Domingo of Peñuelas, Puerto Rico. She was one of Papa Flor's daughters and the matriarch of the Nicholson clan.
- April 13, 1839—María Inés Vilá married Marcelino de la Cruz. Her father, Pedro Vilá, was born in Cataluña, España. They were the grandparents of Papa Flor's wife, Ana Cruz García.
- Apríl 22, 1946—Oscar Cruz García of Peñuelas, Puerto Ríco, marríed Ana María López Maldonado of Adjuntas, Puerto Ríco. They were marríed in San Francisco, CA, and were the parents of Olga, Ruben and Norma.
- April 22, 1986—Florencio Rivera ("Guar") died in Ponce, Puerto Rico.
- Apríl 23, 1995—Oscar Cruz García died of emphysema in Ponce, Puerto Rico. He was 84.
- May 5, 1909—Máximo Cruz, father-in-law of Papa Flor, married his second wife, Genara Maldonado. He was widowed from his first wife, Maria Engracia García.
- May 22, 1914—Elena Sevilla was born. She was Tío Guar's wife, and the mother of René, Roberto, Raúl, Milagros, Lilliam, Reinaldo, Luz, Heriberto and Edwin.

In July, Hayli was also was in the praise band for the Christian Motorcycle Association, which held its annual convention in Seward and was hosted by her church. She spent several weeks in rehearsal for this and had a great time singing for the Lord and visiting with a whole group of people she would never have met before. They had five performances in the three days. CMA thought Hillcrest's Praise Band was one of the best they ever heard and they could not believe the big voice coming out of so small a girl.

Praise Band has been Hayli's mission for the church ever since she was old enough to join in her freshman year of high school. In addition to singing with the worship team, she has done several solo performances. Her last solo performance touched so many of the members hearts. She sang, "I Believe," as an advent song. Many in the congregation had tears in their eyes, and Hayli herself got emotional when she got to the part about the lonely tree. This is the version that is on You Tube. The church had her sing it again a couple of months ago because it fit so well with the Pastor's sermon about belief and faith.

Hayli also spent a lot of time during the summer on her art and photography. She always enters her art and always manages to whip her grandmother. Her photo called "Peekaboo" won best overall at the Seward County Fair. Her art piece "Girl in the Shadows" also won the big prize for her age group. She enters her photography in the county fair and also the Women's Club contest every year. Last year she won six first place ribbons and four this year in the local contest. She only enters these in the local contests because she is trying her wings, and they are growing bigger by the day.

In addition to art and photography, Hayli is a creative writer. She was recognized as one of the top ten in the nation for her poem on 9/11. In addition she has won three contests for her short stories. Hayli's writing, for the most part, leans much more towards fantasy rather than reality. She currently is writing a novel geared toward middle school to high school age kids. However after I read the first twelve chapters, I am anxious for her to finish it. Maybe it will be another *Harry Potter* novel in the making—who knows? She does not like to write on demand, although she does for school. She picks the novel up as she feels the creativity flow. We hope it does not take ten years to finish. In the meantime, her teachers keep entering her essays and poems in whatever is available. She wrote a story for the VFW called, "Every Soldier Has A Story," which won second place and relates the stories of three family members. It is one of my favorites because she writes about her great grandfather and a cousin who died in Iraq after being there only two weeks.


With all her creativity, her main focus is still music. This year it became evident that she really needed a vocal coach if she wanted to major in vocal music. This has made a world of difference to her and she eagerly runs off to her lessons. Her recital this year included an operatic song sung in Italian. I almost fell off my chair because her voice had become so big and I had never heard her sing that way before. She is interested in all types of music and wants to be able to sing almost anything. Currently she is focusing on a French song, the Irish song "Danny Boy" and songs from the musical, "Annie Get Your Gun". She will be singing "Danny Boy" for District Music Competition this year. She loves singing songs from pop artists but wants to broaden her range of music and be able to sing in different "voices". This summer she will have to decide what she will be singing for her senior solo for "Opening Night" which is the first vocal production of the year and where the seniors get to show off their abilities.

Her band instructor asked me if she was trying out for drum major. She did last year and could have made it, but the flute section was sorely lacking in leadership, so she opted for section leader. Two of the flute players said they were trying out for other positions and she felt that that would only leave her. She would like to be a drum major but wants what is best for the band. She

says that she likes playing, marching, learning the routines and that her "freshies" (as she calls them) are going to need her. Her teacher thought that was the most mature attitude he had heard from a high school student. They usually think only of themselves, not the band as a whole, and feel that the glory is in being the drum major. She wants the band trained and ready to be the best it can be, especially her flute section. That is what a section leader does. She feels the band needs her little feet on the ground. She is first chair flute and will be playing the flute solo in the symphonic piece they are doing for District Music Competition next week. She also is preparing for a flute solo for the spring concert. She will be busy at the District Music Comp since she is also doing a vocal solo and will be singing with the select choir as well. I am hoping for superior ratings all the way around as they got last year. It's not the glory, but being the best you can be with the talent that you have.

In June she is taking her show on the road, so to speak, when she goes on a mission trip to New Orleans. She is very involved with her youth group at church as well as her weekly young woman's Christian small group. She has gotten her best friend Emily involved, also, and they both attended a Christian Leadership conference this year. Emily will be going on the mission trip with her. Hayli went on the same mission trip two years ago but could not go last year due to conflicts in timing. She decided to give a scholarship to someone else who could not afford to go. She does not know who went and she did not want the other party to know who she was. It was to be a gift from God.

July will be filled with Summer Chamber Choir and Marching Band Camp and then in the middle of August her lessons and school will pick up again. She will be a senior...how time has flown from newborn babe to graduation looming on the horizon! Hayli wrote the following about herself...it describes her well.
